A second opinion is a separate opinion from another doctor regarding the care and management of your cancer. Sometimes this is done in person, and sometimes another doctor is simply asked to re-view your records.

What is a second opinion. A second opinion means seeing another GP or specialist doctor for their view on your diagnosis or treatment. This usually means going to a different hospital or GP surgery. You don't have a legal right to a second opinion. But doctors rarely refuse to arrange one for you.

A research hospital or major cancer center is usually a good place to get a second opinion since they should be up on the latest in treatment and diagnosis. Tumor Boards There is a special kind of second opinion that, while not independent, is worth considering because it's a great way to get a wide range of opinions all at once.
