 The vast homiletic corpus of John Chrysos-  
 tom has received renewed attention in re-  
 cent years as a source for the wider cultur-  
 al and historical context within which his  
 sermons were preached. Scholars have de-  
 monstrated the exciting potential his ser-  
 mons have to shed light on aspects of dai-

ly life, popular attitudes, and practices of  
 lay piety. In short, Chrysostom's sermons  
 have been recognised as a valuable  
 source for the study of 'popular Christiani-  
 ty' at the end of the fourth century. This  
 study, however, questions the validity of  
 some recent conclusions. James Daniel  
 Cook illustrates that Chrysostom is often  
 seen as at odds with the congregations to  
 whom he preached. On this view, the Chris-  
 tianity of élites such as Chrysostom had  
 made little inroads into popular thought be-  
 yond the fairly superficial, and congrega-  
 tions were still living with older, more cul-  
 turally traditional views about religious be-  
 liefs which preachers were doing their ut-  
 most to overcome. Cook argues that such  
 a portrayal is based on a misreading of  
 Chrysostom's sermons and fails to explain  
 satisfactorily the apparent popularity that  
 Chrysostom enjoyed as a preacher. Preach-  
 ing and Popular Christianity: Reading the  
 Sermons of John Chrysostom reassesses  
 how we read Chrysostom's sermons, with  
 a particular focus on the stern language  
 which permeated his preaching, and on  
 which the image of the contrary congrega-  
 tion is largely based. In doing this, Cook re-  
 covers a neglected portrayal of Chrysos-

tom as a pastor and of preaching as a pas-  
 toral and liturgical activity, and it becomes  
 clear that his use of critical language says  
 more about how he understood his role as  
 preacher than about the nature of popular  
 Christianity in late-antique society. Thus,  
 a very different picture of late-antique Chris-  
 tianity emerges, in which Chrysostom's  
 congregations are more willing to listen  
 and learn from their preacher than is often  
 assumed.

Aelred (1110–1167) served Rievaulx  
 Abbey, the second Cistercian monastery in  
 England, for twenty years as abbot. During  
 his abbacy he wrote thirteen treatises,  
 some offering spiritual guidance and  
 others seeking to advise King Henry II. He  
 also wrote thirty-one sermons as a com-  
 mentary on Isaiah 13–16 and 182 surviv-  
 ing liturgical sermons, mostly addressed to  
 his monks. This volume contains the se-  
 cond half of Aelred's ninety-eight liturgical  
 sermons from the Reading-Cluny collec-  
 tion, Sermons 134 through 182, as well as  
 Aelred's sermon for the translation of Saint  
 Edward the Confessor in 1163, from the  
 critical edition by Peter Jackson first pub-  
 lished in *Cistercian Studies Quarterly*. For

the most part, the collection follows the liturgical year; this volume begins with a sermon for the birth of John the Baptist and ends with three sermons for the feast of All Saints. It contains sixteen Marian sermons as well as a sermon for the birth of Saint Katherine and a sermon for nuns.
